2024 Back to School Report to Donors



On behalf of the ACCES Society Board, the ACCES Foundation Board, and our beneficiaries, I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your ongoing support of our mission to alleviate poverty through education in the western region of Kenya. This communication aims to provide some updates as we look forward to a new school year for our beneficiaries.

This September, 374 ACCES-sponsored post-secondary students will be heading to school, including 302 continuing students selected in previous years and 72 new students, thanks to your generousity.

2024 Scholarship Intake

Each year, ACCES advertises and awards scholarships to bright and needy students in the four counties that comprise the former Western Province. In April 2024, ACCES received 615 scholarship applications and selected 72 new students, 5 of whom live with a disability, to benefit from a scholarship that will support each to graduation. Alumni volunteers and staff selected 47 university, 15 college and 10 trade school students after interviewing 210 students and conducting home visits for 150 shortlisted candidates.

Donor Visit to Kakamega

I enjoyed observing the interview phase of the scholarship intake process over three days in May with Canadian guests—long-time donors and former neighbors of Beth and George Scott, Conrad and Mary Anne Dickhoff and their daughter Leslie and her son James. The family and I met in Nairobi and travelled to Kakamega by air and



road. We visited important sites in the region over five days, including an ACCES-built elementary school. The family became more familiar with the important work and legacy of ACCES and attended student scholarship interviews. The family continued their Kenyan adventure and enjoyed a safari in the Maasai Mara. The Kakamega Sports Club and Drunken Elephant Safari Lodge donated accommodations which the Dickhoff family purchased at a silent auction at the ACCES 30th anniversary event in Canada.

Civil Unrest in Kenya

Unemployment rates in Kenya are very high amongst young adults. Anyone travelling to the region has seen large groups of working-aged men and women in their twenties and thirties sitting idly in town squares with limited hope of employment. The 2020 Kenya National Bureau of Statistics reported that youth aged 20 to 29 had an unemployment rate of 32.4%, including 7.9% who haven't been employed in any capacity for over a year. Meanwhile, President William Ruto's government, elected in August 2022, has dramatically increased taxes and reduced regulation on various things, including post-secondary tuition rates, to be less reliant on foreign debt. This is the backdrop for the planned peaceful demonstrations scheduled every Tuesday and Thursday against the federal government, in which protesters are demanding accountability and good governance. The goal of the protests is to halt commerce and remind the political class of the impact that regular citizens have on the economy. Although not the aim of the organizers, some groups have used the rallies as an opportunity to incite violence.
